Overview of the Energy Planning Program

Through long-range strategic plans and programs, SANDAG strives to increase energy efficiency and cleaner energy supplies, and reduce petroleum consumption, to sustainably meet the region's energy and climate needs. As part of this work, SANDAG provides energy and climate planning support, to member agencies in the form of "Energy Roadmaps" which help jurisdictions save energy in their operations and communities.



Intern Responsibilities

With the guidance and mentoring of senior staff, this position will provide a "hands-on" learning experience in the regional planning profession. Examples of intern responsibilities include:

- Contribute as a team member to various energy efficiency and climate research projects and planning studies; participate in meetings and liaise with project partners; assist with coordinating activities.
- Support the Energy Roadmap program; participate in the coordination of project outreach and implementation; assist with researching and developing program materials and facilitate member agency and SANDAG staff participation.
- Assist with staff support activities for the Regional Energy
 Working Group; record and summarize minutes and actions for
 distribution; assist with specific follow-up requests that arise from
 meetings.
- Collect and compile information required for meeting agendas, committee reports, and presentations.
- Contribute to the preparation of various types of reports, summaries, correspondence, and presentations.
- Respond to requests for information from the public or other interested parties.

Qualifications

SANDAG employees are known for their commitment to excellence and passion for the work they do. We look for the same qualities in interns. To be most successful in this position, our ideal candidate would have the following education, experience, and attributes:

- Graduate level coursework in public policy, urban/regional planning, or a related field with a specific focus on energy, climate change, or sustainability.
- Knowledge of current issues and trends related to energy efficiency, climate change mitigation and adaptation, and California energy policy.
- Ability to complete assignments that involve researching, analyzing, and synthesizing information into written summaries, reports, or recommendations.
- Proficient computer skills with MS Word, MS Excel, MS PowerPoint, and Internet research.
- Ability to communicate with various audiences using exceptional interpersonal, written, and oral communication skills.
- Excellent organizational skills, attention to detail, and ability to multitask and work on several projects simultaneously.
- Demonstrated flexibility and willingness to perform a variety of tasks typical of an entry-level planning position.

Hours, Pay, and Perks

Interns are paid \$13.50 per hour, and are eligible to receive prorated holiday pay, paid sick leave, and a regional transit pass. This position is offered as one-year opportunity, working approximately 20 to 25 hours per week. The work is primarily performed during SANDAG's normal business hours and, from time to time, may involve evenings and weekends; a specific schedule will be worked out between the intern and manager.

How to Apply

We encourage all interested candidates to apply for this internship by sending us a completed Employment Application form along with a recent 2-to-3 page writing sample. A cover letter describing how this internship would contribute to your career goals in the planning field as well as a resume is desirable.
