Opportunity Spotlight

Building Initiative for Low-Emissions Development Program (BUILD)

<u>Senate Bill 1477</u> (Stern, Chapter 378, Statutes 2018), authorizes the Building Initiative for Low Emissions Development (BUILD) Program. BUILD technical assistance and incentive applications are now being accepted.

- Incentives
 For Building owners or developers of low-income housing
- Free <u>Technical Assistance</u>

Fact Sheet

Applicants that are one of the following may be eligible to participate in BUILD.

- Private owner or developer
- Public owner or developer
- Nonprofit organization
- Tribal Communities

Projects must be in one of the four IOU gas service territories.

Projects that meet one of the following categories may be eligible.

- Residential new construction
- Residential alteration where more than 50% of exterior walls are altered
- Repurposed commercial building for residential housing

BUILD incentives consist of a 3 Step process: Step 1: Design Reservation (optional): Applicants can reserve BUILD incentives based on the initial building designs, and apply for the New Adopter Design Award, if applicable. The initial term of the design reservation is 18 months, by which time eligible applicants must meet the readiness requirements to proceed to Step 2: Construction Reservation. (If applicants are further along in the project development, they may apply at Step 2 instead.) Step 2: Construction Reservation: When applicants are ready for construction, or in the early phases of construction, applicants can apply for the construction reservation for the initial progress payments. The construction reservation is valid for 36 months from the date of the construction reservation commitment letter. Step 3: Project Completion: When construction is completed, applicants can receive their final payment. See the BUILD Program Guidelines, Chapter 5: Program Participation, for more details on the steps and requirements.

Transformative Climate Communities (TCC)

Community-led transformation to enable the California communities most impacted by pollution to choose their own goals, strategies and projects to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and local air pollution.

Total Investments: \$230 million





Project Framework

TCC funds climate resilience projects from a menu of project types:

- Affordable and sustainable housing developments
- Residential weatherization and solar projects
- Water-energy efficiency installations
- Food waste prevention and rescue
- Urban greening projects
- Health and well-being projects
- Transit stations and facilities
- Electric buses, vanpools, car and bicycle share programs
- Electric vehicle charging infrastructure
- Bicycle and pedestrian facilities
- Brownfields redevelopment
- Community microgrids
- Indoor air filtration




Transformative Projects



Applicant Eligibility

- Community-based organizations
- Local governments
- Nonprofit organizations
- Philanthropic organizations and foundations
- Faith-based organizations
- Coalitions or associations of nonprofits
- Community development finance institutions
- Community development Corporations
- Joint powers authorities
- California Native American Tribes



Round 4 Funding Available

The FY 2021-22 budget allocates \$115 million* for TCC

- Implementation Grants \$105 million
 3 awards for \$35 million each
- Planning Grants \$1.2 million
 4 awards for \$300,000 each

*5% of total funding will be allocated for program administration

Implementation Grants



Project Area Requirements: Priority Populations

Project Area must be contiguous and less than 5 square miles

At least 51 percent (51%) of the Project Area must overlap with Census Tracts designated as disadvantaged per Cal EPA:


Top 25 percent (25%) of CalEnviroScreen (4.0 or 3.0)

Federally recognized tribal boundaries

The remaining 49 percent (49%) or less of the Project Area must overlap with either:

- a disadvantaged community per CalEnviroScreen, or
- a low-income community per AB 1550.

CalEnviroScreen 4.0



Project Area Requirements: Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities

At least 51 percent (51%) of the Project Area must overlap with areas designated as a disadvantaged unincorporated community (DUC).

4 methods to determine eligibility:

- Verified DUC status by LAFCo and disadvantaged per CES
- Eligible location per TCC Mapping Tool
- Self-identified DUC using localized data
- Previous TCC Planning Grant recipients with unincorporated areas

The remaining 49 percent (49%) or less of the Project Area must overlap with either:

- an eligible DUC
- a low-income community per AB 1550

Planning Grants



Planning Grants Overview

- Grants of \$300,000 each
- Support planning activities in disadvantaged communities
- Prepare communities for future TCC grants or other resilience implementation funding
- Planning process must address one or more of the TCC
 Transformative Elements
- 2-year grant term, with the option to extend on a case-by-case basis
- Must be a minimum of two (2) Co-Applicants

Examples of Eligible Projects

- Capacity building among staff and departments, as well as among external stakeholders
- Evaluating, updating and streamlining various policies and codes enforced by the Planning Department
- Completion of fiscal analyses and studies to understand long-term costs
- Preparation of climate action and adaptation plans
- Community engagement that results in innovative and meaningful programs and practices
- Community Land Trust feasibility studies, project site identification, project readiness preparation


Applicant Eligibility

- Must include a minimum of two (2) Co-Applicants
- Priority in scoring for applications that demonstrate strong and diverse partnerships with CBOs and other stakeholder groups
- Either the Lead Applicant <u>or</u> one of the Co-Applicants must be a public agency.

Planning Area Requirements

- Contiguous
- Project Area must overlap with census tracts designated disadvantaged per CalEPA and CalEnviroScreen:
 - Top 25% disadvantaged communities (CES)
 - Federally recognized tribal boundaries in CA



- Online Submittal
- Documentation that application meets all eligibility requirements, such as planning area map, letters of support, etc.
- Narrative Questions
- Detailed Budget and Work Plan

Transformative Elements

- 1. Community Engagement

1. Community Engagement

Applicants must develop a Community Engagement Plan with 2 main sections:

- Description of Community Engagement during Proposal Development
- 2. Description of Future Community Engagement
- Appendix C describes:
 - O Methods to facilitate community engagement
 - Criteria for eligible costs



Changes for Round 4:

 Expanded eligible costs: food, childcare, transportation, compensation to expand access

2. Workforce Development & Economic Opportunities

Applicants must develop a Workforce Development and Economic Opportunities Plan with 2 major components:

- 1. Workforce development and education training programs
- 2. Explanation of how TCC investment will create high-quality jobs

Changes for Round 4:

 Clarification of eligible job trainings and placements to prepare residents for a carbon constrained economy

3. Displacement Avoidance

Changes for Round 4:

 Mapped policies as short-term vs. long-term strategies

Applicants must develop a Displacement Avoidance Plan with 4 major components:

- 1. Describe displacement vulnerability for residents and small businesses
- 2. Current policies, plans, ordinances, or programs
- 3. Identify additional policies and programs to be pursued*, and entities responsible for implementation
- Provide a relocation plan pursuant to CA Relocation law if necessary for activities with potential for displacement

^{*}Outlined in Appendix C

4. Climate Adaptation & Resiliency

- Identify climate change risks in Project Area, such as:
 - O Additional days of extreme heat or precipitation
 - Wildfire
 - O Flooding
 - O Sea level rise
 - O Drought
- Discuss anticipated impacts to vulnerable populations
- Describe how proposed projects will reduce risk and promote resiliency

Changes for Round 4:

 Additional resources and guidance for identifying and prioritizing adaptation projects

5. Leverage Funding

- Applicants must leverage additional funding sources that equal a minimum of 50 percent (50%) of the total requested grant funds.
- Committed at the time of application submittal
- Funds must be spent in the TCC Project Area
- Appendix C includes examples of eligible sources of leverage*

Changes for Round 4:

The chart below illustrates how the 50 percent (50%) leverage funding requirement may be met:

6. Data Collection & Indicator Tracking

Grantees track 2 main categories of indicators:

- O California Air Resources Board GHG and co-benefit indicators
- O TCC Program Additional program-specific indicators

Grantees estimate GHG reductions during the following phases:

- O Application Phase initial estimate
- O Project Implementation annually, close-out

Grantees also participate in qualitative evaluations during the grant:

- O Focus groups, interviews, surveys
- Case studies of lessons learned

Project Area Requirements: Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities

Changes for Round 4:

At least 51 percent (51%) of the Project Area must overlap with areas designated as a disadvantaged unincorporated community (DUC).

4 methods to determine eligibility:

- Verified DUC status by LAFCo and disadvantaged per CES
- Eligible location per TCC Mapping Tool (see below)
- Self-identified DUC using localized data
- Previous TCC Planning Grant recipients with unincorporated areas

DUC eligibility using TCC Mapping Tool:

- Clusters of unincorporated parcels (250 parcels per square mile)
- Disadvantaged census tract per CES (Top 25%)
- Hard-to-Count census block group per CA Hard-to-Count Index (score 57-133)
