Why SLECC?


Build deeper understanding and stronger collaborative relationships between State and local agencies to identify barriers and streamline and improve delivery of energy and climate information, resources, and services.

Purpose

The SLECC will serve as a **statewide communication and ideation hub to help State and local leaders improve coordinated efforts** to more rapidly unlock the unique potential of California regions and communities to address energy and climate goals.

The SLECC will **identify priority needs and co-create operational solutions to advance place-based energy and climate action**.

The SLECC will primarily focus on clean energy and climate mitigation issues (including in buildings, transportation, and land use), but will also address aligned issues including energy and climate resilience, workforce and economic development, housing, health, and equity.

- •California formula allocation: \$4.5 million
- •Local Government Building Decarbonization Challenge
- •Local governments individual or group of jurisdictions
- Planning projects only
 - No construction projects to avoid CEQA & NEPA
 - Building decarbonization measures
 - Statewide goal: decarbonization by 2045

Local Government Building Decarbonization Challenge

- Federal requirement: Minimum of 60% of CA allocation must go to local governments <u>not eligible</u> to receive a direct formula grant
 - Remaining funds will be available to all jurisdictions
- Federal requirement: Grant agreements must be signed within 180-days of award
- Solicitation release date: Spring 2024
 - Awards by Fall 2024

Overview: Council Priority 3



- Resolution passed December, 2022
- A shared whole-of-Council vision and commitment to elevate, coordinate, and accelerate progress toward the State's housing, climate, and equity goals.
- Three-tiered approach
 - Alignment across State policies and programs
 - Coordination between State, regional, and local governments
 - Public engagement
- Currently collecting input for June, 2024 update to the Strategic Growth Council

Work Plan

- The Work Plan is organized around three goals, outlined in the resolution.
 - 1. Ensure existing opportunities to simultaneously advance the State's housing, climate, and equity objectives are utilized to their full potential.
 - 2. Identify and elevate additional tools and strategies to meet the State's housing, climate, and equity goals in a coordinated way and at the scale and pace necessary to close existing gaps and meet the urgency of current and projected needs.
 - 3. Improve coordination and information sharing between State, local, federal, and Tribal partners at the nexus of housing, climate, and equity.
- Each goal is supported by 2-3 strategies, each of which includes actions for implementation.
- Each action is associated with a timeline (0-1 year; 1-2 years), and lead and supporting entities.






Common Barriers to Grant Access

- 1. Finding the right grant can be a challenge
- 2. Public grants can be overly onerous and complex
- 3. Under-resourced communities may lack the capacity or technical skills to apply
